

# Collective Worship / "Assemblies" at Carlton Road Academy

Collective Worship **aims to promote spiritual, moral, and cultural development**. It is compulsory for all schools to perform an act of collective worship daily unless students ask for an exemption. However, it does not have to take place in a school assembly and can be done with smaller groups in individual classes.

"To worship is to show a lot of love and adoration for something. Religious believers worship gods, and people can worship other people and things too." <u>https://www.vocabulary.com/dictionary/worship</u>

When we come together to "worship" we therefore celebrate what we treasure and love as a school community, this may be a discussion about a value that is important to us or a question about the world that is special to us. About a story, an experience or a thought-provoking moment that enables us to reflect on our environment.

The guidance states that majority of collective worship across the term should have a broadly Christian character, but not every act of worship must. Assemblies can include non-Christian material without depriving them of their Christian character. Assemblies can include elements common to other religions as well as Christianity.

What holds people and communities together are relationships and values and these lie at the heart of our school. Collective worship and assemblies: **pull all members of the school together into a cohesive community**. promote the shared values of the school.

## Why do we worship at school?

We **naturally want to celebrate the good and worthy things achieved by individuals and groups in our community**. We may want to celebrate special or significant occasions within the school family and our community at large. We may want to reflect on wider world issues and challenges. We could wish to give thanks for goodness, fortune and gifts received. These readily form part of our school's collective worship. Worship has a way of changing our lives and giving us different perspectives on how we see our circumstances. It is a life skill to be broad minded, to see and understand the world from the point of view of those who follow the Christian or other faith instead of just our own perspectives, even if we may choose to take a different stance, especially if one is not personally "religious"; we believe in giving our pupils the wherewithal to make informed decisions.

## The purpose of "Reflection"

In our hectic adult lives and for children used to the busy day in school a moment to reflect is a valuable one. "Active, persistent, and careful consideration of any belief or supposed form of knowledge in the light of the grounds that support it, and the further conclusions to which it tends, constitutes reflective thought." John Dewey

# Our weekly pattern of worship

## On Mondays we reflect on British Values

Our Monday assembly focusses on a topical issue linked to a British Value, this demonstrates how these values are part of everyday life and how they work in a real context.

#### Tuesday's - "I believe..." Assemblies

This collective worship, which is divided into a gathering for the upper and lower school (same inspiration age related pitch), covers a breadth of content but is focussed on what it means to believe, which is presented as an open question.

The subject matter varies by the week but is topical and or relevant to the season, such as understanding the meaning behind an event in the Christian Calendar, an individual with important Christian heritage or a bible story e.g. "Why is Lent a special time?" "What is Epiphany?", "Who was St George and why is he our national saint?", "How did Joseph come to have a coat of many colours?"

The content will also include other faiths, events, or people with significant beliefs e.g.: "How is Eid al-Fitr celebrated?"; "Where is the river Ganges and why is this a sacred place for Hindu's?"; "What legacy did Nelson Mandela leave in South Africa?", "Why was Mary Seacole inspirational?"; "Where would you find the Guru Granth Sahib?".

Reflections These would be selected to be appropriate to the content of the collective worship but may be sourced from the purpose and content links suggested at the end of this document-



## On Wednesday we consider children around the world (In Class worship)

We use the Unicef resource within picture news to reflect on the Unicef Child's "Right" that has been highlighted and is topical for this week.

The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, or UNCRC, is the basis of all of UNICEF's. It is the most complete statement of children's rights ever produced and is the most widely ratified international human rights treaty in history. The Convention has 54 articles that cover all aspects of a child's life and set out the civil, political, economic, social, and cultural rights that all children everywhere are entitled to. It also explains how adults and governments must work together to make sure all children can enjoy all their rights.

Music is an important part of worship and praise to God for Christians and those of other faiths worldwide.

"Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts." Colossians 3:16

Hearing our children sing on a Tuesday afternoon cannot help but to make one smile and feel uplifted, it gives us a voice in common. It brings together all of our pupils from the range of heritages and countries that they hail.

In the Book of Psalms in the Bible, people are encouraged to "Sing to the Lord a new song" (Psalm 149.1). There is a place for old favourites but learning new songs is a vital aspect of keeping worship vibrant and alive, providing us with new ways and words to express worship, to learn about ourselves. Our music lead has devised a programme of songs which change each half term each of which introduces the children to a different musical genre, a time from history, reason to sing or simply to celebrate!


**Reflection – Sung on arrival and departure:**

# Friday's – "ASPIRE..." Assemblies

These are times when we come together to celebrate the significant achievements of those in our school community, the achievements are worthy of note because the child, children, team has / have shown how they have upheld our school ethos and values, which is a cause for praise and recognition. These success stories give us the opportunity to reflect on the values that bind us a school and create a sense of community and pride. They help generate modest pride and self-respect.

Children who have demonstrated a particular effort to work within the school's ethos and towards our values are nominated by their class teacher, to have this experience shared, and receive a certificate to remember the moment. At the end of the presentations the children are all applauded by their peers.

The values we share and celebrate are Christian in their nature but are equally relevant to those of other faiths or beliefs.

We may, as relevant draw upon our Trust values too.
